ARRIVAL AND DISMISSAL

SCHOOL HOURS

All Primary and Lower School classrooms are opened at 7:30 a.m.

At drop-off and pick-up times, there will be no parking on campus. Please do not arrive earlier than the designated pick-up times. Please schedule off-campus after-school classes, practices, or appointments after 4:00 p.m.

PRIMARY SCHOOL HOURS

Kindergarten: 8:00 a.m. – 2:00 p.m. (optional 3:15 p.m.)

Classes for Kindergarten begin promptly at 8:00 a.m. and conclude at 2:00 p.m. Please drop off your child between 7:30 and 7:50 a.m. You may choose to pick up your child at 2:05 p.m. or 3:15 p.m.

First and Second Grade: 8:00 a.m. – 3:10 p.m.

Classes for First and Second Grade begin promptly at 8:00 a.m. and conclude at 3:10 p.m. Please drop off your child between 7:30 and 7:50 a.m. Pick up will begin at 3:15 p.m.

LOWER SCHOOL HOURS

Third through Fifth Grade: 7:50 a.m. – 3:05 p.m.

Classes for Grades Three through Five begin promptly at 7:50 a.m. and conclude at 3:05 p.m. Please drop off your child between 7:30 and 7:45 a.m., and pick up your child after 3:10 p.m.

TARDINESS

Children who arrive at school after the classroom start time will be marked tardy. We encourage students to arrive early to ensure a positive beginning to the school day.

BUSES

We strongly encourage our families to take advantage of Viewpoint's safe, efficient, and affordable bus transportation program. Offering flexibility and convenience, the School's bus service is contracted through Tumbleweed Transportation, a company specializing in independent schools. All of the buses are equipped with seat belts and exhaust particulate traps, and the company carries an excellent record of safety and reliability. GENERAL INFORMATION

Please read and observe the following rules to ensure the safe and efficient arrival and dismissal of students. Thank you for your help!

The **Primary School** is located in the Virtue Building on the Mary Carpenter Campus off the west end of Dry Canyon Cold Creek Road.

The **Lower School** is located on Athletic Field One, adjacent to the Rasmussen Family Pavilion.

- To ease congestion on the roads around the campus, arrive early to drop off your child and arrive well after the end of school to pick up your child. Please allow time for your child to gather his or her belongings and to walk to the designated pick-up spot after school.
- Place a placard on your dashboard with the last names of children riding with you to assist with the efficiency of the pick-up of students at the end of the day. The School mails printed placards to families in August. You may also write your own placard.
- Since our space for the pick-up of students is limited, do not arrive early to wait on campus for your child. Your car will block our roadways. In addition, we want to be good neighbors to the local community. Please do not wait on the roads near the campus; the Sheriff's Department will be issuing tickets for cars parked illegally on Mulholland Highway and Dry Canyon Cold Creek Road.

DROP-OFF AND PICK-UP PROCEDURES

- **Primary School:** All cars for Primary School should enter the Primary School lot located at the west end of Dry Canyon Cold Creek Road. Primary School carpools with older students should use the Primary School Lot for both drop-off and pick-up.
- **Lower School:** Lower School students have two options for student drop-off and pick-up. Lower School students in mixed carpools with Primary students should enter the Primary School lot located at the west end of Dry Canyon Cold Creek Road. Cars with just Lower School students and mixed carpools with older students should enter the Lower School and Middle School lot from Mulholland Highway.
- You may not walk your children through the parking lot at any time during drop-off or pick-up. The safety of the children is our highest concern. We will have faculty available to assist our students on a daily basis.
- When dropping your children off, please have their backpacks and belongings ready for an efficient exit from your vehicle. Please avoid removing their belongings from the trunk, as it delays the line.
- For the safety of all students, faculty, and parents, cell phone use is prohibited in all carpool areas.

EXTENDED DAY PROGRAM

- **Primary and Lower School Extended Day Program (Mornings Room 320, Afternoons Room 8):** Our Extended Day Program is available for an additional fee from 7:00 to 7:30 a.m. and again from 3:15 to 6:00 p.m. Students who arrive before 7:30 a.m. should report to the Extended Day Program in Room 320 of the Lower School campus. Parents must always escort their child to and from the Extended Day Program, and sign them in and out respectively.

CHILDREN NOT PICKED UP BY 3:45 P.M.

All students who are not picked up by 3:45 p.m. will be escorted to the Extended Day Program in Room 8 on the Primary School Campus.

EMERGENCY PREPAREDNESS

Viewpoint has a comprehensive Emergency Plan in place to ensure the safety of its students, faculty, and staff in the event of a disaster such as a fire, an earthquake, or an emergency evacuation. The School's Emergency Plan was written with the guidance of the local Sheriff and Fire Departments. Based on their advice, should there be a local fire or earthquake the School has an effective plan in place for these emergencies.

HOW THE SCHOOL COMMUNICATES WITH PARENTS

1. EMERGENCY PREPAREDNESS ONLINE

Should you have any questions about a possible emergency in the School's vicinity, first check the Emergency Preparedness Page on the School's Web site at www.viewpoint.org. You will find the link to Emergency Preparedness information on the flashing banner. The School will provide regular updates to this page to inform you about how a local emergency may be affecting the School.

2. Viewpoint School's Voice Broadcasting System: ALERTNOW Rapid Notification Service

The School uses a voice-messaging system called ALERTNOW Rapid Notification Service. In an emergency, this system is used as the primary means for families to receive up-to-date emergency information.

The successful delivery of messages is dependent upon accurate information for each student. Please be certain that we have your most current contact information on your child's Emergency Form. If this information changes during the year, please contact Mrs. Nicki Thierry at 818-591-6564 or nthierry@viewpoint.org immediately.

3. Viewpoint’s “800” Telephone Number

If we have not been able to reach you by phone or if you do not have Web access, call the Emergency Hotline for up-to-date emergency information.

Please do not come to campus until you are instructed to do so through one of the messaging systems. If we ask parents to come to campus, we will release children only to those individuals whose names are on file with the School as authorized to transport.

EMERGENCY FORMS FOR STUDENTS

Parents are required to submit a new Emergency Form before the start of each academic year. We ask parents or guardians to keep the information updated. To change your contact information, please notify Nicki Thierry at 818-591-6564 or nthierry@viewpoint.org.

HEALTH SERVICES

The Primary and Lower School Health Office is located near the steps of the pool and Rasmussen Family Pavilion. Children feeling ill, having cuts and scrapes, or needing medication will be taken to the Health Office for treatment and care by the nurse.

Medications: Parents must send all medications and prescriptions to the Health Office. The containers should be clearly labeled from the pharmacy with your child’s name and instructions for disbursement. Students who require daily medication must have a Medication Authorization Form on file with the nurse.

Lice: If head lice are found on your child, he or she will be sent home for immediate treatment. Children may return to school only if they are found to be free of nits. Parents must accompany their child to the Health Office to be checked back into school. If nits or lice are still found, they will not be permitted into the classroom. No exceptions will be made.

Physical Education and Athletics: If a student needs to be excused from Physical Education due to an injury or significant health issue, a note from the parent should explain the problem and duration of the request. If the child needs to be excused from Physical Education or playground play for longer than one week, a note from the doctor will also be required. Excessive absences may result in a grade of Incomplete.

Food Allergy: When a child has a potentially life-threatening food allergy, we recognize the importance of monitoring food intake. When parties are celebrated in the classroom and food is brought in from the outside, the School cannot guarantee or be responsible for the ingredients of these items. We ask that you make arrangements with the teacher to keep special treats in the classroom for your child to enjoy during these celebrations.

EpiPens: If your child has a known allergy to bee stings or to foods such as nuts, it is vital to supply the Health Office with an EpiPen and instructions from the doctor. Allergic emergencies can occur rapidly.

Illness: Parents should keep students home when they exhibit the following symptoms: fever, vomiting, diarrhea, rash, or other symptoms of communicable disease. A child should be free of fever for 24 hours before returning to school.

Crutches and Medical Impairments: When returning to school with crutches, casts, or splints, students should check in at the Health Office with a parent and a doctor's note. The note must state the need for crutches, the anticipated length of their use, and appropriate instructions. Similarly, students who come to school with braces, splints, or casts will be asked to provide a doctor's note indicating the restrictions on activities while at school. Students with crutches, splints, braces, or casts will not be allowed to participate in active play unless documentation is provided which indicates otherwise.

REQUIRED HEALTH FORMS

EMERGENCY CARD

Yearly, parents must complete an emergency form before the first day of school to be kept on file in the Health Office and Divisional Offices. This card is very important. In the event of an accident, the School cannot get medical assistance without written authorization. Please notify the divisional office immediately of a change of address or phone number.

IMMUNIZATION CARD

Viewpoint School and the California Department of Health and Welfare require the completion of an immunization record for every incoming new student before they enter school in September.

UNIFORM REQUIREMENTS

Students must wear the designated uniform throughout the school day, unless the School has previously announced specific exceptions.

PURCHASING NEW UNIFORMS

School uniforms should be purchased through Mills, located at 5844 Sepulveda Boulevard, Van Nuys, 91411. (818-779-1111). Phone orders may be placed by calling 800-541-1850. Online orders may be placed through www.millswear.com and entering Viewpoint School code #1025. The Mills store is located north of Burbank on Sepulveda.

PURCHASING USED UNIFORMS

A large selection of outgrown Primary and Lower School uniforms are donated by parents throughout the year and are available for resale at a reduced cost in the Express Café located in the Primary School. Look for sales information throughout the school year.

ASSEMBLY DRESS UNIFORM AND SEASONAL DATES

Assembly Dress uniform is required for those days when an Assembly takes place (refer to Assembly Schedule).

*On Photo Day in September, Primary and Lower School students should wear Winter Assembly Dress Uniforms for their photos.

DAILY DRESS SELECTIONS

Daily Dress options allow students to choose from a number of uniform selections. Students may select Daily Dress options for non-Assembly days only.

LABELING CLOTHING

All items of clothing, including physical education uniforms and shoes, should be labeled with the student's last name.

APPROPRIATE OUTER GARMENTS

Oversized outer garments, sweatshirts, and other clothing are prohibited. In the event of cold weather, students can wear a coat or jacket outdoors. A school sweater or Viewpoint sweatshirt is appropriate for inside the classroom.

FREE DRESS

There will be Free Dress days throughout the school year. Appropriate casual clothes are permitted on these days. Inappropriate logos on t-shirts, cropped tops, baggy pants, and sandals or open-toed shoes are not permitted.

UNIFORM VIOLATIONS

Parents will receive a telephone call or written notification when a uniform violation occurs repeatedly.

SPECIAL AREAS ON CAMPUS

PRIMARY SCHOOL OFFICE

The Primary School Administrative Offices, located in the Virtue Building on the Mary Carpenter Campus, are open from 7:30 a.m. – 4:15 p.m. to assist Primary School students and parents.

LOWER SCHOOL OFFICE

The Lower School Administrative Offices, located in the Lower School Village, are open from 7:30 a.m. – 4:15 p.m. to assist Lower School students and parents.

PRIMARY AND LOWER SCHOOL HEALTH OFFICE

The Primary and Lower School Health Office is located behind Blaney Patio facing the pool. Students who are feeling ill, are injured, or need medication will go to the Health Office for assistance. It is imperative that you communicate all food allergies and health concerns to the School nurse at the beginning of the school year or whenever any changes arise.

ASSEMBLY AREA

During the 2010-11 school year, Primary and Lower School students will attend most assemblies from 8:45 - 9:30 a.m. (unless otherwise noted), in the Carlson Family Theater. Please refer to the Web site for the most up to date Assembly information.

LOST AND FOUND

Items left unattended will be collected and placed in one of the many Lost and Found boxes on campus. Please clearly label all clothing and possessions that your student brings to school. Please inspect your child's uniforms regularly and return those items taken by mistake.

AFTER-SCHOOL OPPORTUNITIES

AFTER-SCHOOL ENRICHMENT PROGRAM

Anderson Enrichment Opportunities offer a program of after-school activities to all students in Primary and Lower Schools beginning the first full week of school. The classes may include karate, science, chess, music, and sports. These may vary and will be available provided there is a minimum enrollment. There is an additional fee for these activities. You will receive seasonal brochures with details, or you may contact *Anderson Enrichment Opportunities* at 818-249-5599, or www.parker-anderson.org.

AFTER-SCHOOL CHORUS

Primary and Lower School Choruses are open to all First through Fifth Grade students who love to sing. Detailed information about After-School Chorus is sent home shortly after the start of the school year. A variety of musical pieces are taught and students have the opportunity to perform during the school year.

AFTER-SCHOOL DANCE CLUB

Primary and Lower School Dance Clubs are open to all First through Fifth Grade students who love to dance. Detailed information about After-School Dance is sent home shortly after the start of the school year. A variety of dances are taught and students have the opportunity to perform during the school year.

FIFTH GRADE INTERSCHOLASTIC SPORTS PROGRAM

Beginning in Fifth Grade, all students may participate in a variety of interscholastic sports to complement the regular physical education program. We strive for the highest standards of sportsmanship in our athletes and coaches. Students may compete in flag football, basketball, soccer, volleyball, swimming, baseball, and softball.

SPORTS HOTLINE

On game days, parents can check the status of a game by calling the Lower School Sports Hotline at 818-591-6659, which is updated daily, or by checking Viewpoint's Web site at www.viewpoint.org.

HOMWORK POLICIES

At Viewpoint, we believe that homework is designed to reinforce skills that are taught during the school day. We do not expect parents to teach their children at home, but rather to encourage them to complete the assignments independently and on time. Additionally, all Primary and Lower School students will participate in an independent home reading program which requires a minimum of fifteen minutes per night.

We do not suggest spending excessive amounts of time on homework. If your child is having difficulty with a concept or particular assignment and has worked to the recommended homework time limit, a note to that effect should be sent to the teacher so we can address the concern at school.

- **Kindergarten:** Students in Kindergarten do not have daily written homework.
- **Grades One through Four:** Students will have assignments Monday through Thursday.
- **Grade Five:** Students may have some weekend assignments.

Teachers will have their own policies regarding papers and missing assignments. Written information will be provided so that parents and children will have a clear understanding of these policies. Recommended daily homework time:

First Grade	10-15 minutes
Second Grade	15-25 minutes
Third Grade	30-40 minutes
Fourth Grade	45 minutes to one hour
Fifth Grade	one hour to one hour and 15 minutes

In the case of an extended absence, parents should contact the Primary or Lower School Administrative Assistant to make arrangements to obtain missed assignments. Please request make-up work or homework before 10:00 a.m. It will then be available for pick-up in the Primary or Lower School Office after 1:00 p.m. Unfortunately, special projects, classroom activities, and discussions cannot be replicated.

GRADING POLICIES

SCHEDULED CONFERENCES

Each parent in Primary and Lower School has a scheduled conference to discuss the student's written report card and progress for the first quarter. Administrators, teachers, and parents discuss the child's academic strengths, weaknesses, and goals along with his or her social and emotional growth.

All students within a classroom differ in their learning styles and developmental readiness. Each student's progress and behavior should be treated as a private matter, and should not be discussed with other parents. The School or parents may initiate additional conferences at any time throughout the school year.

Parents will receive report cards four times each year in Kindergarten through Grade Two. The categories on the report card, as well as the grades assigned, reflect a developmental evaluation of the student's process of learning as well as the work product.

ATTENDANCE

STUDENT ATTENDANCE AND ABSENCES

At Viewpoint we value every school day. Please schedule family vacations to coincide with school holidays and schedule appointments during after school hours whenever possible. Students are expected to arrive on time each day. Many absences and tardies will affect your child's performance at school.

Parents may call and request missed schoolwork when an absence occurs. Please call the Primary or Lower School Office before 10:00 a.m. to make homework requests. Unfortunately, special projects, classroom activities, and discussions cannot be replicated.

More than 20 absences or excessive tardies in a school year may jeopardize your child's standing in the School, including promotion to the next grade level or being issued a re-enrollment contract for the following school year.

Attendance is also strongly encouraged for additional school activities. These include the Holiday Program and Open House. Attendance at these functions promotes a strong sense of community.

SPECIAL ARRANGEMENTS FOR EARLY PICK-UP

Please send a note to your child's teacher if you have an appointment, special plan, or a change in your dismissal time or carpool schedule for that day. The divisional offices are the pick-up sites for students. Parents must come in person to the office to sign their child out of school. At this time, your child will be dismissed from the classroom. Remember to allow plenty of time.

If you need to request an early dismissal or change in pick-up arrangements by telephone, please inform the divisional office prior to 1:30 p.m. Students will not be permitted to use the office telephones to make after-school social plans.

POLICIES ON CONDUCT

At Viewpoint, we believe that optimal learning occurs in an environment of honesty, mutual respect, and courtesy among faculty and students. These values, as well as responsibility, integrity, and a caring concern for others, are the basis upon which trust and open communication can grow.

The School has high standards of performance in all areas, including personal conduct. We expect our students to be on their best behavior in the classroom, on the playground, at assemblies, on the athletic fields, on school trips, and at after-school activities. Proper manners, good dress and grooming, appropriate language, and courtesy toward others are essential components of a healthy and positive school environment.

TREATMENT OF OTHERS

The School expects students to respect the rights and property of others. To be a positive member of the Viewpoint community requires consideration for others and for their feelings. We work diligently to foster kindness and to educate students not to verbally or physically mistreat others. Our goal is to promote behavior that ensures all students will have the opportunity to fully enjoy school.

PROPERTY

The School will not tolerate theft, defacement, or destruction of School property.

CHEATING

Submission of any paper, homework or test that is not completely the result of a student's own study and work is a form of cheating and is not acceptable.

CARE OF CAMPUS

We all take pride in our School and are expected to participate in the general care and upkeep of the campus. Students are expected to utilize trash or recycle bins around campus. Specified eating areas, classrooms, and the locker areas should be kept clean and free of trash.

DRESS CODE

Be neat and clean. Students must wear the designated uniform throughout the school day, unless specific exceptions have been previously announced. In the event of cold weather, students may wear a coat or jacket outdoors. Please stay with the School colors of red, white, or navy. A school sweater or Viewpoint sweatshirt is appropriate inside the classroom.

Non-Viewpoint sweatshirts, designer-label and logo clothing, trendy shoes, accessories, and other items not in keeping with the school uniform are prohibited. Parents will receive written notification when repeated violations occur.

GROOMING

Makeup and hair coloring are not permitted in the Primary and Lower School. Appropriate light nail polish is acceptable.

Hairstyles should be simple and out of the eyes. We recommend that boys' hair be cut above the collar. Hats and scarf-style head coverings will not be permitted in the classroom.

Boys are not permitted to wear earrings; girls may wear studs or small hoops. All other jewelry (with the exception of non-beeping watches) is discouraged.

POLICIES ON DISCIPLINE

A safe, happy, and healthy environment ensures that each student's experience at school will be positive. Our goal is to provide students with an atmosphere of warmth and support within clearly-set guidelines.

At Viewpoint, we choose to focus on positive, rather than on negative behavior. We recognize that all of us make mistakes and ultimately grow by learning from them. This atmosphere of understanding and tolerance promotes maturity and self-confidence in our children.

When necessary, we do apply appropriate disciplinary measures as we seek to help our students accept responsibility, learn from their mistakes, and ultimately to make better choices.

COUNSELING

Informal communication between students, teachers, and administrators helps students to understand the nature of an infraction, its consequences, and appropriate responses for future situations.

CONFERENCE

When appropriate, the School will request a telephone or in-person conference to inform parents of inappropriate behavior with suggestions for parental action and support.

SUSPENSION

Recommended by the Head of Primary or Lower School or by the Associate Headmaster, suspension is a short period of time in which the student is dismissed from school. Parents will be asked to meet with the Head of Primary or Lower School before re-admission.

GENERAL POLICIES AND PROCEDURES

PLACEMENT OF STUDENTS IN HOMEROOMS

Classroom placement is a thoughtful process that results from a compilation of information. The Administration's knowledge and input regarding each student is incorporated with the current teacher's recommendation. We cannot accept parents' requests for their children to be placed with certain teachers. Classroom placements cannot be based on friendships. If you have specific concerns, please make an appointment with the Head of Primary or Lower School. Discussions about placement with teachers or other parents are not appropriate. Often information that is passed on from parent to parent can be taken out of context or misunderstood. All conversations regarding placement should take place with the Divisional Head.

PLACEMENTS OF TWINS OR TRIPLETS

With regard to twins or triplets, the School's general custom is to recommend to the parents that they be placed with separate teachers, both during the school year as well as at summer camp.

PARENTS IN THE CLASSROOM

Occasionally, parents may be invited into a classroom by the teacher to read a story, help with a special project, or share a special talent. Unscheduled visits to the classroom should be avoided.

PARENT-TEACHER CONFERENCES

If you would like a conference in addition to the scheduled fall grade report meeting, please call the Primary or Lower School Administrative Assistant who will make an appointment for you. Please do not speak to the teachers during class time, or call a teacher at home. If you have a question, please write a note or leave a message on the teacher's voicemail, and the teacher will respond as quickly as possible.

LUNCHES

Students should bring simple, nutritious lunches to school. Candy, gum, soda, and bottled drinks are not permitted. We discourage parents from bringing fast-food lunches for their children. If a lunch needs to be delivered during the school day, please drop it off in the Primary or Lower School Office. However, since there is a school-provided lunch option five days a week, we encourage parents to telephone the office in the event of a forgotten lunch, and we will see that the child gets a school lunch. Beginning in Fifth Grade, students also have the daily option of buying lunch from a catering truck.

VALUABLES

Personal valuables are discouraged on campus. The School cannot assume responsibility for lost or damaged items. Cell phones, beepers, beeping watches, electronic toys, *iPods*, *iPads*, *iPhones*, expensive jewelry or non-uniform clothing are prohibited without prior permission.

GIFTS

To avoid hurt feelings, students should not exchange gifts at school. Well intentioned group efforts to raise money for gifts for particular teachers or classrooms are not appropriate. If a person wishes to show appreciation to a faculty member, he or she should do it on an individual basis only.

ROOM PARTIES

Four room parties are organized by the Room Parents and scheduled during the school year. Simple food and drinks are served at these occasions. Party favors are not appropriate. Please do not bring younger siblings. Students and parents are asked not to plan surprise parties or birthday parties for students or teachers during school hours.

RAINY DAYS

Primary and Lower Schoolers should keep a compact umbrella in their locker at all times for unexpected showers. Please put your child's name on the umbrella.

LOCKERS

All Primary and Lower School students are provided a locker for their belongings, either adjacent to or inside their classroom. Any backpacks carried by students should be able to fit inside their lockers.
